The last few months has being challenging for the Management Committee with regard to legal matters but as most of you probably know it had a successful outcome with a few outstanding items that are in the process of being addressed.


But I do confess the team has had a breather over the last few weeks from club matters apart from the Sailing Captain who has been preparing the sailing programme.

I have been attending several meetings with the RYA recently and am always shocked at the work done in the background. My inbox is full of applications for renewable energy sites off the coast, together with work on the coastline.

The RYA have policies on renewable energy both tidal and wind to ensure the sites retain navigation without hazard. The office pick up matters and there are at least 3 of us in Wales who comment on each application to ensure boating is protected.

I have also heard of work being undertaken on policies for end of use boats which is a problem in the future.

A lot of the regulation for Boating is considered through the EBA (European Boating Association) and not the EU so a lot of the work will continue but RYA are considering the effects of Brexit. No answers can be given as the questions on such as port access in EU countries, have not even been formulated yet.


The Shoreline Skiffle band with a little help!

Saturday 6th May, 2017 the planned club trip was to Dulas, but with the wind direction coming from the North it was decided to go South.....

Friday, 5th May, 2017 saw us arrive at the clubhouse to be faced with a strong Easterley wind – and we had to get on the boat!!

The only boats that showed an interest in the club cruise, was Avalon, and Laras, and Laras were in Victoria Dock.....so dinghy blown up, taken to the shoreline, with quite large waves rolling in, we set off, rowing for dear life, until we were far enough out to start the engine.

Once aboard Ocean Mood, no time was wasted, and the mooring dropped, due to the weather the plan was to go through the swellies late, and pick up a mooring in the



shelter in Rowan Bay, so not such of an early start on Saturday morning.

Once through the Bridges, the wind subsided, and Jerry decided it would be a good time to calibrate the new autohelm. We did this

Strange Lights

While on the mooring we sorted loads of small jobs that have been bugging me for a while and after we decided to go to the Sailing Club to have a meal with a few people that had turned up on Friday night but we were down at Menai Bridge on the mooring. It was pouring with rain and the dinghy needed topping up with fuel and air and all the things you do when you intend to come back to your boat after dark.

So after a nice evening having a meal and a few drinks (not the driver I must say) we went back to the dinghy which we had left on the Princes pier.

The night was dark, no moon but the sea was flat as we started back to the boat against the tide. As we passed the moored boats and looking at them for the position with reference to our own, it takes about 10mins to reach our position. We passed the last boat before ours and I was looking for our mooring light - the type used in the gardens that recharge over the daytime. But instead of our light we saw navigation lights coming towards us, showing Red, then showing Green, thinking this was oncoming vessel that is out of control I was just about to hail the oncoming vessel when it changed to Blue. Panic was about to set in as I throttled back expecting this strange vessel coming through the moorings to collide with us.

Then looking harder I noticed that the light was emanating from our boat. In fact it was our mooring light that was turning Red, Green and then Blue.

Doing Jobs in the day I had fitted a new mooring light as the old one had died and thinking I was fitting a similar garden replacement type in the day we hadn't seen it in the dark and expected it to be just white !!!

It was removed on getting aboard so as not to cause some other poor soul to have a heart attack


