### Isle of Man update

It was announced mid March that due to Covid **the Isle of Man's borders will be closed until September 2021**. The IOM Enterprise Minister, Laurence Skelly, said that the announcement was regrettable but would provide "clarity and certainty".

**It should be noted that transit vessels can use mooring buoys or anchor off but it is forbidden to moor alongside sea walls or the visitors pontoon in Douglas, except for emergency reasons. Going ashore for any reason other than an emergency is forbidden.**

### Bangor Pier

"The structure off the pier is not safe so Bangor Town Council want to disconnect it from the pier in case of damage. The lit Bangor buoy which is right in front will cover it. Trinity House have agreed the change but there has to be a consultation period. The existing light is on top of the unsafe structure and it cannot be maintained. The invitations were quickly written and sent out via our closed Facebook page and email. We were encouraged to don Scottish garb and Andy appropriately responded with a Tam o' Shanta sporting an attached red-head wig! The quiz was great fun too. Thanks again Andy for hosting. Des, also sporting a 'tam', addressed the haggis with great enthusiasm. It was a very entertaining evening and thank you to all who participated.

On Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> February our President Derek Lumb, who is the Celtic Section Secretary for the Cruising Association, repeated a talk via Zoom previously given to its Celtic Section which was originally part of a series of 5 sessions covering Ireland and the West Coast of Scotland. It was entitled An Introduction to Cruising the West Coast of Scotland from the Mull of Kintyre to Ardnamurchan Point.

Derek shared with us his journey aboard Whispered Secret. He certainly made me feel as if we were sailing with him as he told us about the southern part of this area in the sheltered waters of the Sound of Jura. When you head North and West you pass into the Firth of Lorne with more than half a dozen sea lochs branching off and the centres of Oban and Tobermory before passing out into the Passage of Tiree and the more exposed west coast of Mull with the islands of Coll and Tiree, Gometra and Ulva, the Treshnish Isles and the holy island of Iona plus the west coast of Mull, Jura and Islay. Derek's knowledge of this area showed us that whatever the weather there is somewhere to go in sheltered waters. This is also the centre of the production of the distinctive Island Malts with 8 distilleries on Islay and, with those on Jura, at Oban and Tobermory, Derek assured us you will be spoilt for choice.

Screen sharing made it possible for us to see some fantastic photographs which made me realise how much I am missing sailing. The Antares charts which we were also able to see via screen sharing were very detailed. Derek's knowledge about safe passages and anchorages, and local history made this a totally enjoyable experience. Thank you very much indeed. It was good to see 67 logged in screens from NWVYC and various other sailing clubs and associations from Wales, England and Scotland, as we had opened the invitation out beyond the closed Facebook page.

Looking forward to future social gatherings I can only say that as soon as we are able to, we will organise events to suit whatever level of restrictions are in place. Thank you all for your patience and understanding during this last twelve months as I know that club events have been organised and then sadly cancelled due to various COVID restrictions.

His acceptance into the club as a dinghy sailor was by virtue of the fact that he was a keen long distance sailor in Sundance Drifter his Wayfarer, his latest Wayfarer was Grey Dog, cooking and sleeping in a boat tent. Geoff had circumnavigated pretty much all of the Scottish Western Isles large and small including a figure of eight circumnavigation of the Shetland Isles, no mean feat in a small open boat. Geoff also spent time as a Lt Commander teaching sailing skills to Navel cadets.

Sadly at the age of 61, still strong and active Geoff became ill and had to undergo an operation after which he developed Sepsis and Pneumonia. When Geoff passed away on Monday 30th November it was a huge shock to all that knew him well, especially his sister Helen. Geoff's funeral was on Wednesday 16th December at St Mary's Church, Sandbach, Cheshire. Helen had requested donations go to the RNLI.

Geoff's wishes were that he would be cremated and that his ashes be scattered from a sailing boat at sea.

Together with his wife Carol, they sailed their yacht Abraxas on many adventures, being especially fond of the waters around South Wales. An intrepid and experienced sailor, Derek supported members taking part in the early summer cruise of 2017 to South Wales, willingly sharing his experience of these waters. His timings on how to make Jack and Ramsey sounds in one go were much appreciated. Derek was an esteemed and long standing member of our club, and many members will hold many fond memories. He was a fine sailor, always willing to help and give quiet advice. He will be much missed. Derek's funeral was held on the 17th of March

## Morlais Development Zone

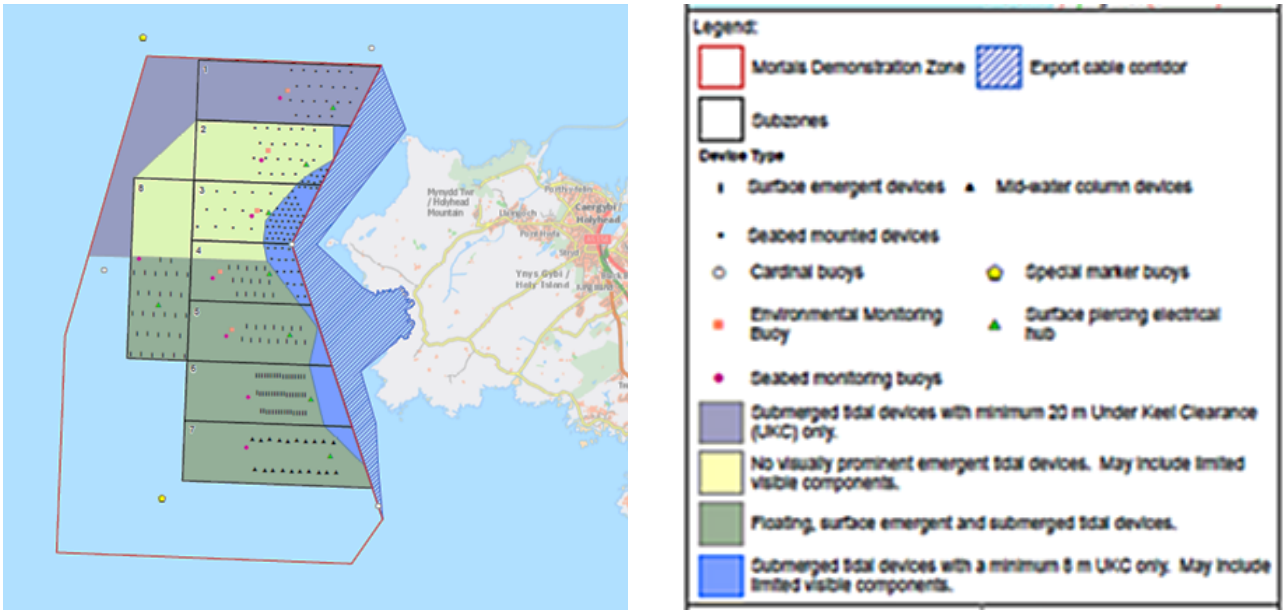
The Morlais Development Zone is managed by Menter Môn, a 'not for profit' company set up to work to deliver projects, mostly in Anglesey and Gwynedd, working for a sustainable future.

One of these projects – the Morlais Development Zone - is of significantly large scale and potential impact. It covers 35 km<sup>2</sup> of the sea near Holy Island, Anglesey, making use of the tidal current resource to generate electricity. It has the potential to become one of the largest tidal stream energy sites in the world with a generating capacity of up to 240MW of tidal electricity. It is intended to secure a renewable and reliable energy source of electricity.

- Morlais will provide the infrastructure for developers of tidal energy converters to deploy their tidal devices on a commercial scale.
- There will be a very controlled phased deployment, with the first turbines being carefully and extensively monitored - only when it is confirmed that there are no negative impacts will further devices be installed.
- Morlais has the potential to generate up to 240 MW of electricity.
- The electricity will be transmitted from the Morlais site to the National Grid.
- Depending on the types of tidal devices used, some may be visible above the sea surface and others will be fully submerged and hidden from view.
- Any moving turbine parts or rotors will be below the sea surface.

- For safety purposes there will be some navigation markers showing the location of the devices.
- Any devices on the surface will have lights similar to the navigation lights on small boats.
- Electricity will be brought to a substation on shore via a maximum of 9 sub-sea cables.

Electricity will be exported from this landfill substation to the existing electricity network via buried cables to grid substation. The area where these devices will be installed:

The purple area is a restricted zone with submerged devices having minimum 20m under the keel; the yellow area is also restricted and has no visually prominent emergent tidal devices (but possibly sub-sea devices); the green area is unrestricted having floating, surface emergent and submerged devices. The blue area would be restricted having submerged devices having minimum 8m under the keel. The hashed blue is the export cable corridor. Whilst the area is not in itself described as an exclusion zone the overall effect will be to exclude sailing vessels from the area in which generating devices are sited. Basically, vessels navigating around the Stacks would have to either keep to the west, or in the corridor between the blue area and the cliffs.

Over the last 12 months our club has become increasingly concerned over the safety of vessels travelling through the zone during the construction phase and the subsequent operation of the zone. We have contributed to the RYA's response to the scheme and public inquiry and we continue to liaise with them. The RYA is representing the recreational boating community over safety, whilst other organisations (RSPB etc.) are representing other environmental concerns.

The RYA, whilst not opposing the scheme outright, has set out a series of safeguards and limitations they wish to see set into the scheme such as:

- Increasing the width of the blue (restricted) zone to widen the corridor along the coast.
- Having no surface emergent devices in the blue zone.
- An 800m wide Escape Channel through the restricted areas orientated SW-NE.
- Tightening the controls over the development of the area, and the monitoring of the impacts

They have made a number of points to the public inquiry, the three main ones being:

- Amenity issues- how the area is used by their members, have not been adequately assessed;
- Economic impact- the impact to recreational boating as an economic driver for the community has not been considered, and;
- Visual survey data had not been included in the NRA and the applicant was forced to disclose this.

Menter Mon has submitted consent applications pursuant to the Transport and Works Act 1992. They also have to complete the Marine Licence process with Natural Resources Wales before the offshore elements of the project can take place. A decision by Welsh Ministers is expected later in 2021.

Whether or not it will go ahead, only time will tell. We certainly will need the green energy but how much are we prepared to pay in terms of limitations on sailing.
