Beat the Winter Blues February Social



Obituary to Roger Willcock

RIP.

Roger started sailing at West Kirby years ago helping the local Sea Rangers sailing a West Kirby Class Star. This was towed each year with other boats to Beaumaris for the Menai Straits fortnight. Roger would transport the Rangers camping equipment in his Land Rover and help them set up their camp at the back of Beaumaris for the two weeks. He sailed with them during the regatta's. He then bought a Westerly 30 called 'Sonkara' from a fellow West Kirby member. This he sailed to the Straits regularly until in very bad weather in the Dee she broke away from her moorings and was wrecked on Caldy cliffs. He then bought 'Corazel' an Atlanta 28 he found in Holyhead, which he kept at Beaumaris, and about this time joined the NWVenturers. She spent most of the summer up the beach in front of the Venturer's Clubhouse while Roger indulged in his other passion, steam trains! Either the Welsh Highland or the Severn Valley which ever took his fancy. He became a regular visitor to the Isle of Man in 'Corazel' spending a lot of time in Port St Mary. About 20 years ago he moved from Heswall to live in PSM where he was regularly on the Steam trains. He would return to Anglesey for a few weeks each year in a Campervan which he parked alongside the Clubhouse. He was a quiet rather reserved individual which stood him in good stead in his role as a Primary School teacher after a number of years in the Royal Navy. He was one of those characters who will be missed by those who knew him but not by those motorists overtaking him as he took his daily exercise on his bike from the Clubhouse to the Bakery in Beaumaris .
